Staffing

Our initial focus for support has been to ensure all pupils have the necessary support for the children's academic learning. We now have various new support staff in place in the school, which will allow us to start some of our health and wellbeing interventions which I'm sure many of our pupils will benefit from and thrive with.

Mrs McFarlane has come back (again) for two days a week, which we are delighted about. She will work with various children across the school and may be in touch with parents to

see how she can further offer support.

Mrs Khan (ex-parent) will join us on Monday (10 Oct) for a few hours each day and we look forward to welcoming her back to the school community to help support pupils in class.

Ayisha who is a student at South Lanarkshire College has started a placement with us on a Thursday and Friday and she will mainly support in and learn about the curriculum at P1&P2.

We also have some parents helpers who have a background in education who have also offered to come in and again we couldn't be happier to welcome them to support our whole school community.

<u>Trips</u>

As you will know by now, the school is given a Pupil Equity Fund and part of this is put over to a Participatiry Budget Team who get to decide what some of our PEF fund will be spent on. The Participatory Budget team who is made up of parents, staff and pupils, got together and came up with some ideas on what we could spend the money on. These ideas then went out to all pupils and parents, and the votes have been coming in. Overwhelmingly, the winner was school trips!

Mr McKissock will send out the official information to you but we wanted to let you know this as soon as possible. This means, that some of our school trips can be subsidised so that parents do not need to pay the full amount. School trips provide amazing experiences and lots of learning outwith the school classrooms where pupils get to develop a wider set of skills that the may not be able to in school. These are invaluable learning experiences where all pupils are always highly engaged and enthusiastic, so we are delighted that we have a better budget to support these.

<u>P7 Trip</u> - Our P7s residential trip has now been orgaised and all P7s will be going to Inverclyde Sport Scotland Training Centre for two nights and 3 days in March 23. <u>This is</u> <u>now available to pay on Parent Pay.</u>



Panto – The whole school will be going to the pantomime again this year. We will be able to subsidise this trip but we will need to ask for a small payment towards this. More details of this will come out soon. The whole school is going to East Kilbride for this on Wednesday 14th December – Oh Yes We Are!

Birthday Cake

We have noticed a rise in the number of children bringing in cakes for their birthdays. Whilst this is a lovely gesture and the children enjoy it, we have many children with varied dietary requirements for various medical and nonmedical reasons. We would ask that you do not send in cake to school and keep this for home. We will always aim to make the children feel special on their birthday in other ways. Sorry!

Fizzy Juice

Our school has always had a policy that no fizzy juice is allowed. Please make sure your children do not bring this in to school. You can probably imagine what a whole school of 205 children who have just had fizzy juice would look like...

Dog dirt

Unfortunately, we have noticed lots of dog dirt around the perimeter of school which is not ideal for obvious reasons. We have also witnessed members of the public letting their dog do the toilet and not pick it up – sometimes as they are on their phone and completely unaware that it has happened. We would hope that there are no parents who would do this, but please be careful when you collect the children as it is often right next to the gates as people walk their dogs around the path.





<u>PE Kit</u>

Can we ask that all pupils wear either trainers or sandshoes for PE. Most children already do this but we quite often have children wearing shoes that are inappropriate for sport and we want them to be fully involved in all aspects of PE. All pupils gould be bring in a PE kit e.g shorts/leggings/jogging bottoms and white plain t-shirt or Park View t-shirt.

P5-7 should only wear the Park View Polo Shirt to PE. For hygiene reasons, they should come to school in their shirt and tie and then change in and out of the t-shirt. Another reminder that earrings should not be worn for PE. Thank You!

<u>Toys in school</u>

Can we ask that children do not bring in their own toys to school (unless for a specific Friday Club). These can get lost and are very distracting when they are learning. We would also ask that children do not bring in soft toys that are actually horror related and inappropriate for younger children. These toys(e.g Huggy Wuggy etc) are encouraging children to look up inappropriate content online and scare some children. The packaging of these toys state that they are for children 12 years and over.

At home, rules can be a lot more flexible but in schools we have to have blanket rules that respect **EVERY pupil and parents' views,** therefore they cannot be allowed.

As always, please check in with your children and their phones regularly. Our children are growing up in a world flooded with digital technology and it can also flood their emotional wellbeing. All too often we have to deal with situations outside of school that have been brought into school when children have sent things to their friends or classmates that are simply unkind. Most of our children would not say these things face to face but feel braver behind their phones – unfortunately the unkind words have the same impact as face to face.

We will continue to implement digital literacy and safety lessons to keep our children safe online, but regular checks at home would help limit some of the messages being sent and limit the unhappiness and upset that it can cause.
